Do you think this would be an effective poster? Why or why not?

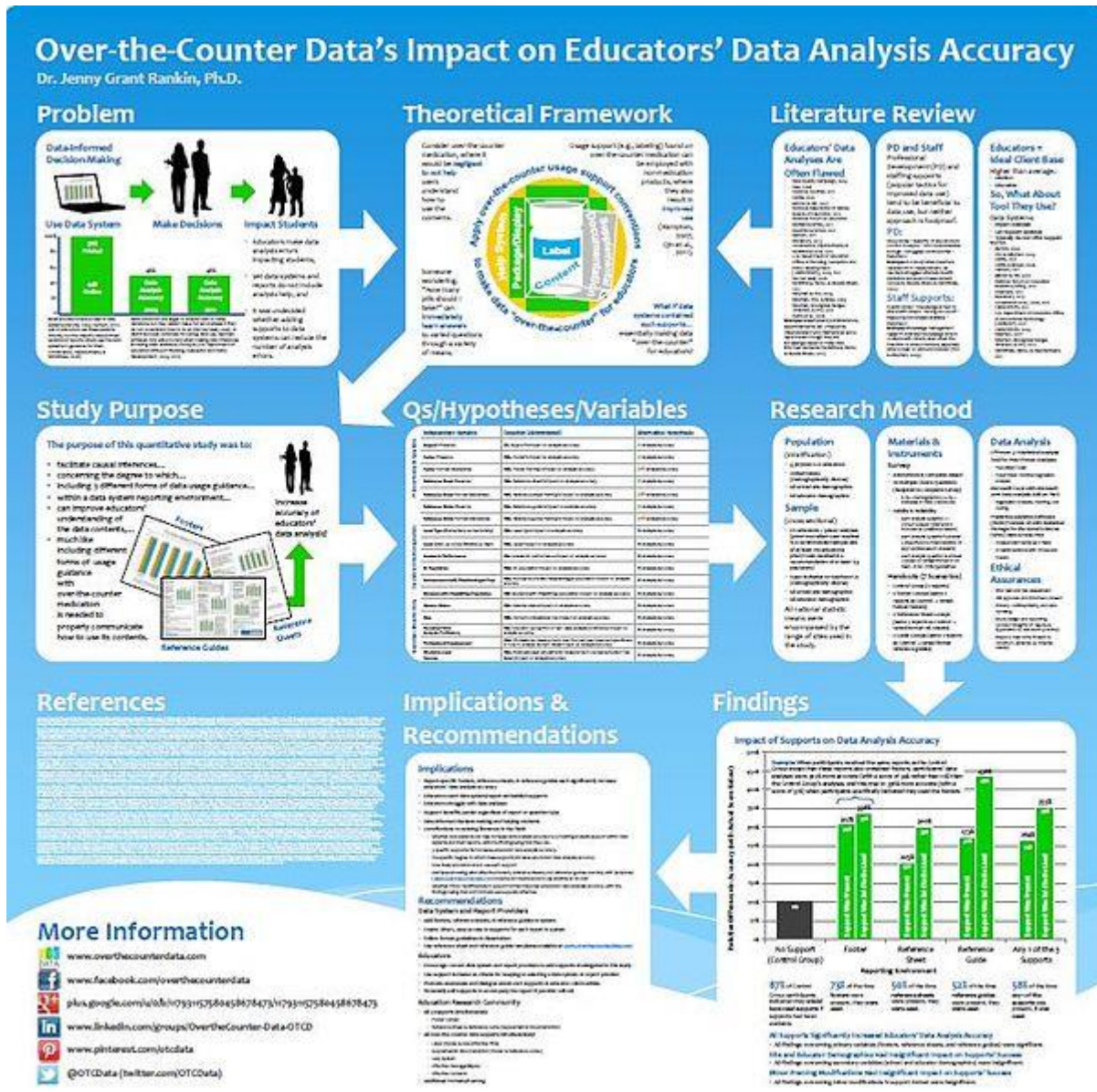

Task 1:

Take turns to do an online image search for a conference poster from your respective fields. How would each of you briefly present the research displayed on your poster? What language would you need to introduce the topic, to talk about your methodology and to present your conclusions? Ask your partner.

When your partner has introduced the poster he or she has chosen, try to ask some hard questions.

Task 2:

Together with your partner, talk about how you would design a poster for a research project you have been involved in, or one you are familiar with. What visuals would you use? How would you present the poster to attendees at a poster session at a conference?
